Question about law and religion and National Justice and Peace Network

A Coventry supporter has suggested that women's ordination in the Catholic Church should be pursued as a matter of justice, and a quote from Bangladesh tells us that lack of authority of women in the church perpetuates a civil culture in which women are silenced and submissive. Following these leads, Colette J helped me formulate this question for the panel of experts chaired by Bishop Kenney, auxiliary in Birmingham, at the recent National Justice and Peace Network Conference in Swanwick on the theme of Justice at Work:

Can the church talk credibly about justice at work when half of humanity is excluded from ordained leadership roles on the basis of a biological difference?

The question was met with applause and cheers from the large audience, and smiles from the panel, as was the short answer of "No."

Roughly what the panel said:

- theologically, this is the only issue where tradition is invoked in a negative way, to take something away, rather than to add something, e.g. as with the Assumption of Mary; the tradition is always in ongoing development as human society changes and evolves, and the new testament witnesses to women's contributions; and not to forget that the council of Chalcedon reduced the minimum age for women deacons to 40!
- but as to church organization: the bishop would be unable to say anything as bishops had to promise not to advocate on this issue. The bishop smiled and said nothing.

There were many informal discussions on the issue over the weekend, including with one woman who has recognised a personal calling to ordination for 6 years and never met another woman who felt the same until now.

Message of Support

I've been looking at your website with interest and felt that I should send you a message.

I was brought up within the RC church, and am now training to be a Methodist local preacher.

I currently live in Stockport, Greater Manchester. Bishop Terrance Brain, the Bishop of Salford, came to our circuit service. I asked him a question. I said, "There are Catholic women who have gifts for preaching, ministry and leadership. Some have found their way towards the Methodist church where they feel their gifts are better recognised and nurtured. What should the Catholic church's response be to these women?" His answer was a totally inadequate re-stating of the position. He quoted Matthew 16 and kept saying "Peter has spoken", referring to JP2's statement on the issue.

It was shortly after that that I took the decision to formally become a Methodist (I had been attending a Methodist church for some time with my Methodist husband, but still liked to call myself Catholic) In a sense nothing changed. I remain a member of the church in which I was baptised, the church of Jesus Christ. I feel that my future path of discipleship lies within the Methodist part of that church. For me, I cannot in all conscience, be part of an organisation that does not regard me as an equal.

One of my reasons for writing is to applaud and encourage those of you who feel called to maintain the struggle from within the RC church. Yours is a path that must requires much courage. I pray that you may have it.

My other reason is to have it known that for all the vocal, objectionable people who are moving into the Catholic Church because they don't support women's ministry, there must be perhaps a greater amount of traffic moving the other way. Many of us end up in other denominations, and others outside the church altogether. We don't have ecclesiastical titles. We don't demand our own sections, or take our church's money with us, but our stories are important.

I pray for a future church, where divisions of man/woman, catholic/protestant are unimportant.

May we be one in Christ.
